## Tender loving care

# clean sweep

Daniel M Johnston goes 'green' and checks out a car wash that omits one usually crucial ingredient – water. But is it any good compared to a conventional wash? Images: Christopher List

It doesn't help that our BMW Z4 and Audi TT are black, which means they are presentable for about one day in a week.

We decided it was time to treat our Beemer to a longer-lasting shine, and check out the waterless car wash. Yes, I did say waterless. So how does Waterwise's eco-friendly solution stack up against a run-of-the-mill manual car wash at the local petrol station?

### THE BATTLE

The BMW Z4 was designated to be washed without water due to its extreme cleanliness

(cough) and the Audi TT was to be cleaned at our local petrol station.

While the Audi was waiting for its first splash of water, the Beemer was well on its way to a new spotless experience with the first application of Waterwise. It was simple — the Waterwise boys spray their "Dry-wash" fluid onto the body of the car, leave it on for a few moments and simply wipe away the grime.


Meanwhile, over at the petrol station the little Audi had only just received its first beating of water from the jet washer. However, the Z was almost done. After having the waterless





eco-friendly product applied, the fluid was lifted off with dirt (and I do mean dirt) in tow with a microfibre cloth. With one application of this bio-degradable fluid and a wipe, the paint work, windows and alloys could see daylight for the first time in weeks.

With the TT done almost half an hour after the BMW and with water seeping from the cracks, spoiling the clean look almost instantly, the result was obvious and the comparison complete.

Waterless is better, although not as quick if you go for interior cleaning as well. It is, however, more cost effective than a standard wash. Most importantly, it's eco-friendly and that's the winning argument for us. **W**
